

CONDITION OF SUSPECT HALTS POLICE PROBE

Operation May Be Necessary on Man Shot by Trooper in Hunt for Murderer

Waterloo, July 14—Questioning of J. Albert Clark, 26, Pennsylvania fugitive and a suspect in the slaying of William Shankwitz, 70-year-old Fayette farmer, will be delayed for several days, it was announced by troopers at the Waterloo substation of state police.

It was expected that Clark would be questioned early this week at Waterloo Memorial Hospital where he has been confined since June 23 with a bullet wound in his right hip following a battle with Sergeant Dillon's gun fired when he sought to flee, and before Clark recovers an operation may be necessary to remove splinters of bone, it was said today.

Railroad Bridge at Batavia Repaired

Batavia, July 14—The New York Central overhead bridge in East Main Street was closed today by the New York State Division of Highways.

A new bridge floor is being put down and it was found necessary to close the bridge to traffic as when the wood blocks were taken up, it was found that the planks underneath were badly rotted and would have to be replaced. Amosite, an asphalt product, will be used as a top surface to replace the blocks which have caused much trouble in the past two years.

Garden Crop Survey Started in Seneca

Waterloo, July 14—Edwin E. Coughran of the staff of the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca is making a survey of Seneca County in regard to garden crops.

Some of the points included in the work are varieties of crops grown in the county, value of these crops in supplying food for the family, and comparison with the amount grown in other years.

Waterloo, July 14—Drilling on the Charles E. Myers farm in the town of Reading is again at a standstill. The shaft, one of the deepest in the Schuyler County natural gas fields, has been in operation for nearly a year and a half.

Drillers Fix Seven Wells as Week's Gas Field Quota

Daily Flow of Seven Million Cubic Feet Reported for 56th Producer; Boy Scouts, Medics to Be Visitors

Wayne, July 14—By the end of this week seven new gas wells will have been drilled in the Wayne-Dundee gas field, it was indicated today.

Producer 54 was drilled in and capped by C. F. Goble on the Schuyler Hayes farm for the Belmont Quadrangle Drilling Corporation this afternoon. Goble estimated the daily flow at 7,000,000 cubic feet after the drill had penetrated through the sand strata.

Two Wells Daily—The schedule for the next three days calls for two wells to be drilled in each day of the field indicated this afternoon.

New Police Chief Selected at Lyons

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Not a Dollar Missing as Convicts Turn Over Money Saved from Burning Home

Attica, July 14—Swept by a brisk northerly breeze, flames from the barn on the Leon Gay farm, about a mile south of this village, ignited the house and another barn to the rear about one o'clock this afternoon. All were totally consumed, doing damage estimated by Mr. Gay at \$7,000.

More than 50 convicts from the state cantonment at Attica rushed to the fire under command of Sergeant John Shea as soon as Sergeant Shea saw the fire. They did remarkably quick work, according to bystanders, emptying the house completely of furniture and storing it in the barn on the Steadman property across the road.

Fire equipment from the village did not come to the fire, as an ordinance prohibits going outside the corporation. Chemicals sprayed on the sides and roof of the house and other barn would have saved them, according to Mr. Gay. This is the second time in a month when it is claimed that chemicals from the village trucks would have saved buildings which were consumed.

Paper money was strewn on the ground as the convicts hurriedly searched for valuables. Money picked up by the convicts and given to Mr. Gay. His check revealed that all of the more than \$50 had been returned to him.

Late Castile Resident Leaves \$33,000 Estate

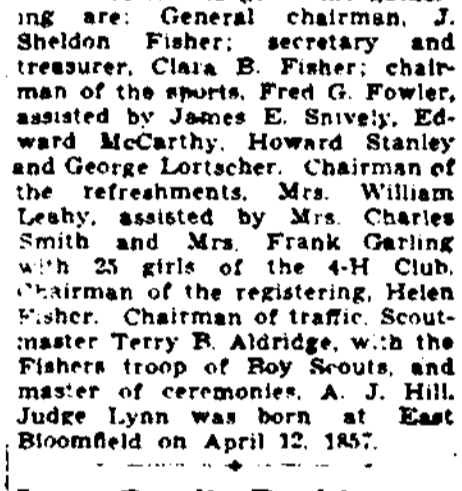
