

Archie Cuykendall, Police Justice, Dies

VICTOR—Archie Cuykendall, 69, of 104 School St. who was a member of the Victor Fire Department for more than 50 years and a village police justice for the last four years, died yesterday (Aug. 31, 1959) in Thomson Hospital, Canandaigua, of a stroke and heart attack. He had been ill at that hospital for the past six weeks.

Mr. Cuykendall was born in Mumfordsville, Ky., July 10, 1890 and moved to Rochester with his family near the turn of the century. He attended school there and came to Victor about 1910. He worked as a water boy while the old Rochester and Western Railway was being pulled through the village in the early 1900s. In 1916 he married Alva Van Denberg of Victor. They had no children.

DURING THE 1930s Mr. Cuykendall served several terms as a justice of the peace in the town and he was serving his first term as village police justice when he died. He joined the Milnor Lodge, F&AM 139, more than 40 years ago and served as its master in 1924.

He was a captain in the Home Guard during World War I and at one time was a member of the U.S. Marine Corps, serving in Latin America.

MR. CUYKENDALL has been employed by the old Locke Insulator Co. here until it closed in 1933. He was employed in 1935 by the newly-formed Victor Insulator Co. which succeeded Locke, and was a foreman there until his retirement in August of 1955.

Besides his wife, Mr. Cuykendall is survived by two sisters, Mrs. Gertrude Gielow and Mrs. Mildred Finnerty, both of Rochester and by two brothers, Earl of Rochester and Howard of Fairport and by several nieces and nephews.
